question: What do anthropologists do with the data they gather and the insights that emerge from their studies of humankind?

answer: Applied anthropologists use the theories and methods of anthropology to solve social or practical problems . . .

This course is designed to examine various dimensions of and issues associated with applied anthropology. Students will: learn about the history of applied anthropology and its place in the discipline of anthropology; be introduced to the content areas of this subfield; the research methods used in applied research; ethical issues in applied work; and the roles of applied anthropologists in solving contemporary social problems. Over the course of the semester, we will examine the practice of anthropology and fieldwork techniques in real-life settings, such as criminal justice, health, business, community-based organizations, education, environment, social policy and/or organizations dedicated to social change . . .
